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the autobiographical narratives of black ex slaves published in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries constitute the largest body of literature produced by slaves in human history black slaves in the new world created a veritable literature of escape depicting the overwhelming horrors of human bondage these narratives served the abolitionist movement not only as evidence of the slaves degradation but also of their intellectual capacity accordingly this literature has elicited a wealth of analysis and controversy from its initial publication right up to our day this volume charts the response to the black slave s narrative from 1750 to the present the book consists of three sections selected reviews of slave narratives dating from 1750 to 1861 essays examining how such narratives serve as historical material and essays exploring the narratives as literary artifacts

this book is intended for researchers in the field of narrative from post graduate level onwards it analyzes the audio recordings of the narratives of former slaves from the american south which are now publically available on the library of congress website voices from the days of slavery more specifically this book analyses the identity work of these former slaves and considers how these identities are related to master narratives the novelty of this book is that through using such a temporally diverse and relatively large corpus we show how master narratives change according to both the zeitgeist of the here and now of the interview world and the historical period that is related in the there and then of the story world moreover focusing on the active achievement of master narratives as socially situated co constructed discursive accomplishments we analyze how different inherently unstable and even contradictory versions of master narratives are enacted

thesis m a from the year 2006 in the subject american studies literature grade 2 7 university of bamberg professur flr amerikanistik language english abstract in this thesis paper each of the three black autobiographical writings will be discussed in chronological order the paper begins with frederick douglass s narrative from 1845 continues with w e b du bois s darkwater from 1920 and finishes with the autobiography of malcolm x from 1965 the purpose of this chronological organization is to better trace the development of black autobiographical writing over the period of 120 years each autobiography s discussion is divided up into three distinguishable components a summary of each memoir provides a background against which the further stylistic and thematic discussions can be attempted secondly the historical circumstances basic structure and narrative techniques of the respective eras of black autobiographical writing and of the specific works will be discussed the purpose is to closely look at typical features or in the case of the autobiography of malcolm x genres of black autobiographical writings in each period and then in a second step analyze each work s specific stylistic and narrative peculiarities the third and last component of each autobiography s discussion is a close textual interpretation it shall analyze the development of the self image of each author as presented in his autobiographical work these observations will be synthesized in the conclusion of this thesis paper the eventual aim of this study is to prove the three thesis elements first of all it shall be demonstrated that african americans have written autobiographies to comment on the unjust societies they have been living in since slavery secondly it shall be proven that the three distinguishable stages of black autobiographical writing are best represented by this selection of books and finally one will see that the self images of the authors as presented to the reader in these works show similarities in many respects and thus continuity in the status of african americans in us society is visible

it is quite appropriate for dr waters to examine voice in these three important narratives on the african american experience in slavery by analyzing how equiano douglass and northrup used language symbolism experiences and events in their lives as slaves to describe critique and attack slavery dr waters provides us with the subtextual meaning of the narratives the most important contribution is that it provides scholars and studnets with a new way to analyze and understand american slave narratives one of the most fascinating phenomena of american history is how the slave experience of africans in america has been documented to balance the myth of the old south with the brutal realities of racial oppression indeed the united states is quite unique in having a body of narratives by former slaves to balance and challenge the myths and lies of the master or slaveholding class about the nature of american slavery in the atlantic world at least no other people who were formerly enslaved have written and produced as extensive a body of literature to document expose and chronicle their experience in slavery thus these narratives are very valuable because they e

african american slave narratives of the 19th century recorded the atrocities of the antebellum south and provided a solid foundation for the african american literary tradition by presenting 16 slave narratives in their entirety this reference conveniently documents this historically significant literary genre a vivid and moving history of african americans seeking to establish community liberty economic independence and education within the constraints of a repressive society this reference intentionally avoids well known narratives and instead collects unavailable and otherwise difficult to find texts to add to the value of the work for researchers and general readers alike each narrative is accompanied by a preface explanatory notes and suggestions for further reading many of the narratives gathered here were influential when initially published josiah henson s presentation of himself for example embodies many of the characteristics given to uncle tom by harriet beecher stowe in her novel uncle tom s cabin while other collections often only provide excerpts from widely available texts this reference includes complete narratives the introductions and annotations redefine current thinking in the field by closely examining how these authors used language structured their writing and crafted their autobiographies by examining the historical cultural literary and social issues that african americans have faced since their arrival this reference provides the broad context necessary to understand the literary historical and intellectual traditions from which these writings developed

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
